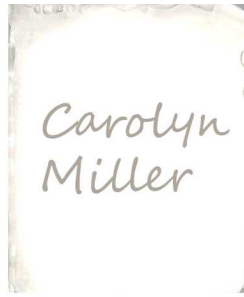

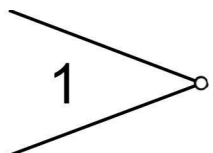
**I'm assuming by more serious side of photography you mean doing commercial work. How much did your experience prior to changing direction help you transition?**

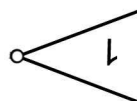
barely out of the frame to grab him as he toppled. But it's not just about the planning or the technical ability. Photos tell a story. I hope this photo does that.
